From the Mayor's Desk:

We are already three months in to the new year. Time passes quickly.

As our city grows, there are certain things that residents want. Whether it's a grocery store, fast food restaurant or other business considering Brookland as a place to locate, the first thing they do is tour our city. We may not even know that they are looking at our city. So, if I am a new business, thinking about locating in Brookland, I will visit and drive around the city. This gives potential investors an idea of what, we as citizens, think of our community. Do citizens that live here care about how their city is perceived? I think every citizen in this city cares about Brookland. However, there are areas that we need to address as a city to move forward. We have tried to govern under the idea that if citizens think they are part of something great like Brookland, they will act accordingly. The majority of our citizens do care and take care of their residence accordingly, but there are areas that we must admit need attention. So, at the March city council meeting, I read a proclamation, making April 1, 2017 through October 31, 2017 "Brookland Pride" months. I don't know how it is at your home, but when we have friends and family coming to visit at our house, we diligently clean our home for our company. That is what we, as a city, are doing. We have "company" (i.e. businesses) coming, so we are going to prepare Brookland to put our best foot forward. To help combat this problem, the police department has broken the city into two areas. Area 1 is everything south of School Street and Area 2 is everything north of School Street. Area 1 will be covered by Chief Jon Moore and CID officer Blake Miller; Area 2 will be covered by Captain Janssen Settlemoir and Patrolman Cameron Sailor. Our part-time officers will also be helping in these areas. City Inspector, Doug Frederick will be tasked with the process of looking at unsafe, abandoned structures. Arkansas Code Annotated § 14-54-901, covers a municipal governments authority to protect the community and promote quality of life.

Gambill Subdivision has progressed slowly this winter. The project should be nearing completion by the first of April. Another project that has seemed to be moving at a snail's pace is the water improvement project. The plans were finally approved by the Arkansas Department of Health and bids were accepted on February 14, 2017. Line work, elevated storage tank, well and water treatment building work will begin, weather permitting, the last week of March.

Storm water drainage has been a major issue between Holman (49B) and the Union Pacific Railroad for years. The city has purchased a lot and built a detention pond, installed 48" underground culverts, so the section of East School Street can be widened and the intersection straightened out. The city applied for three State Aid Street overlay projects. Though we were not chosen this year, we were told to resubmit our applications. We have resubmitted the requests and expect these overlay projects will be at the top of the list for 2018, per officials.

Sidewalk projects that Brookland has been chosen to receive are moving forward. Work on the North Oak sidewalk, that will connect the Brookland Elementary and Brookland Middle Schools is scheduled for this summer. The sidewalk that will run from the Brookland Police Department, north to School Street is in the beginning stages. We are working diligently to get this project done by the start of the 2017-2018 school year. Plans are to submit a grant request for a new sidewalk that will begin at School Street and run north to the Gambill and Brookland Hills Subdivision. I hope to have more information on this project in the third quarter newsletter in July.

We have also started taking bids on removal and replacement of old dilapidated sidewalks through our city. Sidewalks allow students to walk to school safely and folks a safe place to walk for exercise. Just want to remind everyone that spring and summer time is a great opportunity for everyone to get outside, so parents please talk to your children about using the sidewalks, when they are available, for their safety. If you drive a vehicle, please obey the speed limit and pay attention to the surroundings and children outside playing and riding bikes. Swimming pools will soon be put up and filled with water. Please see article in this newsletter specifications regarding on fencing.

This is a reminder that Ordinance 2008-17 requires that all swimming pools, 15" or more in depth, have a fence of not less than four feet in height. Said enclosure shall be a minimum of four feet from any edge of the pool. A copy of this ordinance can be obtained at City Hall.

wastewater info:

An issue I need to address is, to make residents aware of the consequences of putting cooking grease/oil down the sink. It could clog up your sewer service lines, and the build up from several residences that pour grease down the drain causes the city sewer mains to become clogged, thus causing sewage to back up in several homes in your neighborhood. This creates an extra expense for the utility department to have to treat the grease buildup and flush out the sewer mains. A suggestion to eliminate this problem would be to let your grease or oil cool down and then place it into a Ziploc bag and simply put it in the trash. Also, another problem is residents flushing kitty litter down the toilet. This gets into the pumps at our lift stations and causes them to malfunction or fail. It is very expensive to replace the pumps and creates an additional burden on our wastewater system.

Inflow is another issue at our wastewater treatment plant.

This occurs when rainwater gets into the sewer system through a sewer clean out plug that has been removed or broken off or when a sewer service line has been broken and over time, dirt will cave in the surface of the pipe allowing rainwater to flow into the line. All this additional rainwater has to be treated with chemicals, the same as the sewer water, before it is discharged. The usage of additional chemicals to treat the rainwater is another expense incurred by the utility department. If you have any broken pipes or sinkholes in your yard, please notify our office and have one of the utility workers come and inspect the area.
